


# The harbour of Lepcis Magna: earlier phases




The harbour up to the reign of Claudius.  
The small islands shelter the area  
around the mouth of the Wadi Lebda.



The harbour after the Julio-Claudian  
alteration (finished around 61/2 CE) and  
before the damming of the Wadi Lebda  
(likely early 2<sup>nd</sup> cent. CE)

Excavations inside the harbour basin attest that it silted up between the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> centuries CE (Laronde 1996). Houses were built in the area.



One of two shrines on the opposite sides of the harbour mouth. Severan period.



In 93 CE, a local suphetes built a huge temple near the mouth of the Wadi Lebda thanks to a bequest by [Clau]dia Pia and his own *summa honoraria*. Under the temple podium there is ample storage space.








IRT 349a – IPT 9
