## JORDAN HILL ROMAN TEMPLE

These foundations are of a temple, where worship of a pre-Roman or a Romanized deity took place. It was built near the end of the Roman period in the 4th century AD, as a two-storied shrine which contained an effigy of a god or goddess, now long forgotten. The shrine was surrounded by a single-storey open ambulatory, with a lean-to roof supported on columns. The temple stood in a large walled sanctuary, where rituals and ceremonies took place.

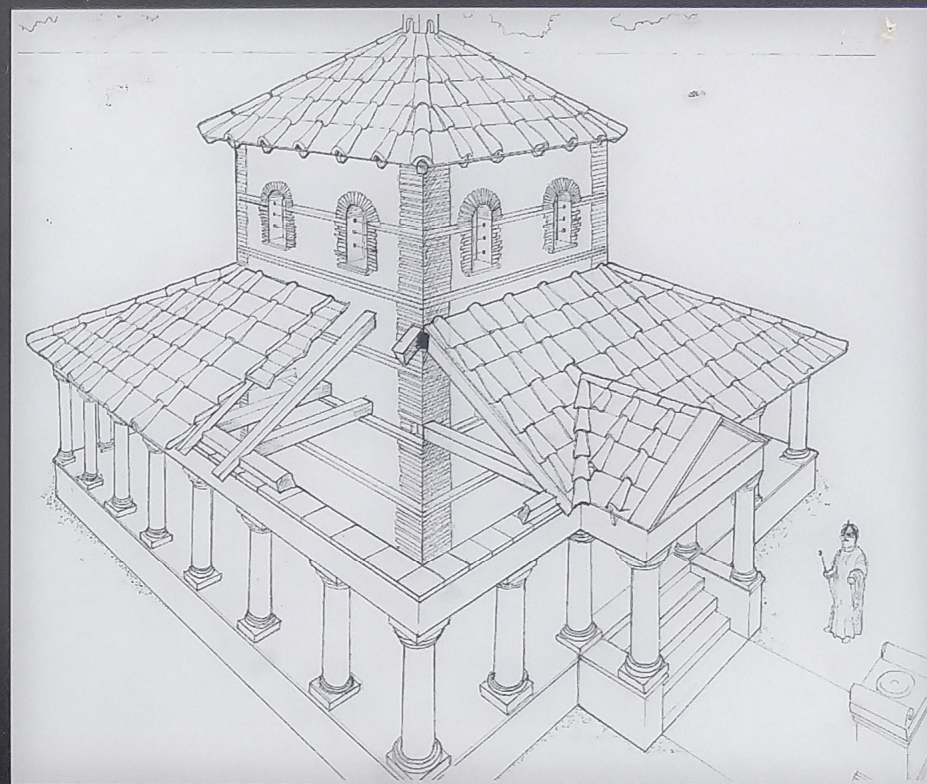
